



#### Ghosts and Spirits Around St. James

On All Hallows' Eve, as the moon rises and shadows lengthen, we gather around blazing fireplaces to share ghostly tales. Every creak of wood or sudden cold spot in the room feels like a sign from beyond. Even those who don't believe in the Great Pumpkin might entertain the possibility of seeing it arise at midnight.

After 45 years of ghost hunting, mediumship, and spiritual exploration, I've collected countless experiences – moments where the veil between the physical and the ethereal seemed to join. They are special occurrences, touches of awe from otherworldly people who broke through the dimensional space that separates us.

Beautiful St. James is no exception. It is a spiritually vibrant place where the voices of the past still

continued from page 14 linger – their souls alive and well, though their bodies are no more. Without physical form, the departed find creative ways to send signs and messages.

Ghosts and spirits, though often spoken of together, are not the same. Ghosts are remnants of energy, like old films playing again and again. Peter Underwood, in his book, *Ghosts: And How to See Them*, lists ten different types of ghosts. They are atmospheric memories, locked into replaying the same scene whenever triggered. Ghosts don't follow us home or acknowledge us – they simply appear and vanish.

Every year, Deepwells Farm in St. James hosts a haunted mansion tour, complete with scary themed rooms to frighten and surprise all who dare enter. Built in 1845, this Greek Revival mansion has seen many owners, including the mayor of New York City in the early 1900s. But the ghosts of Deepwells are not merely Halloween props - the place is really haunted. I witnessed one of their apparitions during an event I hosted there one evening. As I walked the second-floor hallway, I felt someone watching me. As I turned my head to look down the hallway, I saw the shadowy figure of a man. The figure glanced back, then vanished.

Ghosts remain imprinted in the places where the energy was left.





That is why some old European structures show apparitions seemingly hovering above the ground – floors and foundations may have crumbled, but the ghost remained locked at its original height.

Spirits are different from ghosts. Spirits are people – without, as I like to say, their rental car bodies. Our body is like a car: it carries us through life, lets us work, travel, and experience the world. Eventually however, the car breaks down, but the driver lives on. Like the car, our souls continue long after the body has died. Spirits often seek out loved ones, to give them signs and messages, making their presence known in creative and often humorous ways. They hold the experiences of their past lives and the memories of those they loved; the fullness of their personalities intact.

Last year, I shared these ideas during a presentation called "Ghosts Around St. James" at the St. James Cultural Arts Center – the old Calderone Theater on Second Street. Built in 1929, the theater itself is haunted by decades of performers and patrons. During the talk, I played recordings captured with EVP recorders and a spirit box. EVPs – Electronic Voice Phenomena – are voices imprinted on ambient noise. A spirit box (also called a ghost box) scans radio frequencies to let spirits communicate. The EVPs I played were diverse and included spirits talking and even musical instruments playing.

After my presentation, it was decided we'd follow up with a live ghost investigation event for those interested in participating. The goal was to confirm the theater's restless history of spooky goings on. During that investigation, we documented orbs – translucent balls of light – photographed by several witnesses. A well-dressed man in a top hat appeared to more than one investigator. Equipment registered energy fluctuations, and unexplained cold spots marked rooms that were otherwise warm.

In addition to the St. James Calderone Theater and Deepwells Farm, there is the St. James General Store. Ebenezer Smith built the store in 1857, and it served the community by providing goods and services to the local farmers of that time. Like Calderone and Deepwells, the General Store has had its share of ghostly activity as well. One employee at the store saw the apparition of a little girl with long brown hair in old-fashioned clothing. She appeared frightened before vanishing. Another worker heard a child crying when no one else was present at the store. Cold spots also occur with no apparent explana-

Ghosts generally make silent appearances while spirits are more vocal, interacting with us.

William Sidney Mount, born in Setauket in 1807, remains one of the area's most intriguing spirits. Mount was a musician, writer, inventor, and a painter of genre scenes often filled with humor and social commentary. He also be-

continued from page 16 lieved deeply in Spiritualism, holding séances at the Haddaway House – today's Country House Restaurant. Mount's presence has persisted, even 'haunting' local historian Kerriann Flanagan Brosky during her research for the *Ghosts* of Long Island book series. Mount kept urging Kerriann to use a book cover he preferred, even though the cover didn't align with the publisher's expectations!

Kerriann's experience with William Sidney

Mount's spirit prompted her to ask me if I could have William give her a direct message. I cleared my mind and wrote verbatim what I heard him tell me through my clairaudience, a type of mediumship where you hear messages spoken by spirit.

Kerriann had William's personal journals – he wrote about his daily life experiences in them. Kerriann had a good sense of what things William would say and how they'd be phrased. I had finished William's message, handwritten on a legal pad. It talked about our first visit to his home, a screen door to the summer kitchen that mysteriously opened and closed before our eyes, and a pair of red-tailed hawks that showed up and circled above our heads.

The message read, "Joseph, why did your legion leave the property so quickly after the hawks appeared? We had really wanted you to stay with a good heart. Kerriann is all despondent about your little episode with the door opening and frustrated about the 'apparent' problem... and lack of respect for my house. This will be a frightful experience for her to quote my commentary and persuade others to my cause. Like you, it will be evident in the long term – but not now."

I emailed the message to Kerrian, which prompted a quick response from her. She told me the message matched exactly the tone, word



style, and vocabulary contained in his personal journals.

At the Country House Restaurant in Stony Brook, you can have fine dining and maybe get a glimpse of the property's longest residing ghost - Annette Williamson, a young girl who during the Revolutionary War was murdered by the townspeople who thought she was a British Loyalist. Annette makes herself known to patrons by creating a light flash in the dining rooms like the oldstyle flash lamps, where photographers ignited flash powder for a brilliant burst of light. Others have seen Annette's face in the window or even her entire form in various places on the property.

Sometimes spirits manifest in other ways... At Deepwells Farm, a ghostly cello was heard playing when no musician was in the music room. At Strong's Neck where it's said Anna Smith Strong hung clothes on a line to send secret messages to George Washington's Culper Spy Ring, Kerriann and I recorded the sounds of guns and canons being fired from warships.

Spirits can also utilize nature such as birds, butterflies, or animals. In East Setauket, Kerriann and I spoke with Chief Gail Joyce Revis (Happiness of Running Water) of the Setalcott Indian Nation. Sitting with her on a medicine wheel blanket near her ancestral cemetery, the chief shared the story of her people.

When she spoke of their journey across Long Island Sound in canoes, a red-tailed hawk circling above the crest of the nearby bluff cried out. The Chief smiled and told us, "I hold the hawk – the Thunderbird."

St. James and its neighboring towns are filled with paranormal energies in each corner of their carefully maintained landmark properties, woodlands and waterways that date back hundreds of years; energies

left by Native Americans, pioneering settlers, and people of the Revolutionary and Civil War eras. These otherworldly visitors want to be acknowledged and not forgotten.

Next time you visit St. James and happen to pass its old buildings and dark woods on a moonlit night, listen closely. You may hear the whispers of those from time long past.

Patterns of Attachment: Sculptures by Pam Brown features small and large scale works by Pam Brown. Inspired by wildlife and American history, Brown's sculptures explore themes of extinction, the human condition, and the interplay between nature and industry. Using wire, sheet metal and other salvaged materials from abandoned sites, she constructs skeletal, artifact-like forms that blur boundaries between the organic and manmade, familiar and uncanny. In a deliberate, painstaking approach that is evocative of craft traditions and domestic labor, Brown cuts the materials by hand with scissors, assembles and darns them together. Sheet metal and wire replace the

fabric and thread of needlework alluding to both "women's work" and early industrial manufacturing. Brown places gendered practices in new contexts and develops them as signifying elements.

Pam Brown received a B.F.A. from Alfred School of Ceramics, NY, and an M.F.A. from Mason Gross School of Art, Rutgers University,



NJ. She is the recipient of two National Endowment for the Arts awards and a NJ State Individual Artist Grant. She served as

faculty, director and curator of the Anthony Giordano Gallery at Dowling College for 17 years. Brown's work has been exhibited in numerous local and regional galleries, museums and sculpture parks. She currently resides in Stony Brook.

We had watched the Eva Longoria series, Searching for Mexico.





Not far from Mexico City is Teotihuacan, site of two Mesoamerican pyramids which predates the Aztec empire by many centuries. It once had a population of over 25,000 people being the largest city in the Americas from the 2nd to the 6th century. The Pyramid of the Sun towers above the other ruins at 216 feet high .

170 miles from Mexico City is lovely San Miguel de Allende. Because of the beauty of the surroundings and lovely architecture, it attracts thousands of tourists and new residents every year. We walked its quaint streets, lined with markets selling colorful handicrafts, then ate in a rooftop restaurant and watched the sunset over the steeples.

On to Guanejuato which is known for its Baroque architecture and its ornate churches with intricate facades. We visited its magnificent opera house which has been the concert venue for many world class singers. It is also famous for being the birthplace of Diego Rivera.

Guadelejara is the second largest city in Mexico and is a center of business, arts, technology and culture. It has 22 museums. Because of this, the city was named an American Capital of Culture in 2005.



Originally a seminary, the Museum of Fine Arts contains 16 halls of paintings and ceiling and wall murals telling the history of Mexico. We wandered through its beautiful inner courtyard, then visited the San Juan de Dios Market which is the largest indoor market in Latin America.

Watching tequila being made in

its namesake city topped off our lively and interesting itinerary. The tequila plant is ubiquitous in the desert and there were huge piles of the cactus-like plant. After a few samples of the different strengths of this popular brew, we were dancing in the streets.

A fun time was had by all. Salud!

He never imposed it on me, knowing how I felt about Catholicism. He was simply a man who led by example. Every Sunday, without fanfare, he dressed in his suit and went to the 7:30 Mass at St. Matthew's in Dix Hills—for 53 years. I admired his steadfast faith and his equal respect for my lack of it.

There are so many things I miss,

especially the beautiful cards he gave me on birthdays and anniversaries. When we were engaged, he gave me a charm inscribed with the words, You are Always in my Heart. That became our saying. I had it engraved on his headstone, and I will share it with him again when I die. He signed every card with that phrase. My daughter knew how much it meant to me. After he passed, she took one of his cards with those words in his handwriting and had it engraved on a plaque. She gave it to me as a Christmas gift, and it hangs by my bed. Every morning, when I open my eyes, I see his words.

There is no expiration date for grief. But there are small ways to hold onto the heart you once shared. And in that, there is comfort—a reminder of how extraordinary life can be when you are blessed to share it with someone so special.







#### Compromising in Decorating & Life

#### Planning Your Business Exit: Start With the End in Mind

If you own a business, you've probably spent countless hours thinking about how to grow it, manage daily operations and serve your customers. But have you thought about how you'll eventually step away from it? While it might seem premature, planning your successful exit from your business is one of the smartest moves you can make as an owner.

The reality is that most business owners have 80% to 90% of their net worth tied up in their companies, according to the Exit Planning Institute. That's a significant investment that deserves careful planning to protect. Unfortunately, 70% to 80% of businesses put on the market don't sell, and about half of all business exits are involuntary due to unexpected circumstances like health issues, family emergencies

management disputes or economic downturns.

Exit planning is more than preparing for retirement. It's taking control of your future and ensuring you can transition away from your business when and how you choose. You can startwith the end in mind – a proactive approach that can inform your current business decisions and help increase your company's value and marketability.

Begin by articulating your personal goals for both the transaction and your life afterward. Maybe you want to sell only a portion of your business, stay on as a paid consultant or use the proceeds to start your next venture. Understanding your vision helps shape everything else. You'll want to calculate how much money you'll need to fund your desired retirement lifestyle, accounting for expenses that may be



currently covered by the business, like your cellphone, vehicles, travel and health care. Don't forget about your legacy goals too – what you want to leave for your family or charitable causes.

Getting started requires building a strong professional team. At the center should be a financial advisor who can help you through the planning, execution and post-sale phases. You'll likely also need a tax professional, legal advisor, commercial banker and business valuation expert. Depending on your exit strategy, you might later add specialists like business brokers, investment bankers or employee stock ownership plan advisors.

Understanding your business's current value is crucial. It's a good idea to get a calculation of value at least three to five years before your planned exit. This isn't as formal or

expensive as a qualified appraisal, but it gives you a realistic range of what your business might be worth.

This step may reveal a gap between what you need financially and what your business could sell for. If so, don't panic. You have several options: work longer, adjust your spending expectations, save more outside the business or focus on increasing your company's value. You can boost value by increasing profits through higher market share, new products, better pricing or reduced costs. You can also improve intangible assets like employee expertise, operational systems and customer relationships.

Finally, consider who your successor might be. Selling your interest to family members, business partners or employees often provide more control over timing and lower

transaction costs, though they may result in lower sale prices. Selling the business to third parties typically bring higher proceeds but less control over the process.

The key message is simple: It's never too early to start planning your exit. Whether you're thinking about stepping away next year or in the next decade, taking proactive steps now puts you in control of your business's future and your own financial security.

#### Guard Your Happiness, Treat Hearing Loss

Dear Ron,

Since I retired, I love to do volunteer work. I have worked with animal rescue, animal training, activities at my place of worship, and even for larger national groups with local chapters. The reason I have worked at so many places is that I encounter that same type of personality at these groups... people who are in "authority" who are just so rude and demanding. I get that things need to get done, but let's face facts. I'm giving my time in support of

a cause. I only have so much to give. This cause is just one part of my life. I resent when someone says or strongly suggests that I could do more. My husband says to ignore it and just do what I can because what's the worst that will happen? I need some tips on how to let these people just roll off my back so I can continue to embrace the charity rather than quit... again.

Dear Helping Hands,

For point of clarity: If anyone is verbally or physically abusive at any time, tell someone in authority at the charity. If the person remains there, then you may want to step out. However, if you enjoy your volunteer tasks and only have a single person who makes it relationally difficult, I think your husband is on the right track. Make sure you have properly portioned out your volunteer time vs. other time so your volunteering time stays in balance. It will allow you to feel confident and empowered when you answer, "I have given all the time I have planned, if asked to do more. And if the disappointment is more about how others speak and act, then it's time to build up a new layer of skin and remember that your presence, your time, and your skills are the real reason YOU are there. Your goal then would be to refocus your thinking in these awkward moments on the giving of yourself rather than how someone else is telling you how to give.



#### HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Halloween is enjoyed by people of all ages, but few get a bigger kick out of the holiday than children. There are costumes to be worn, time spent with friends and the opportunity to collect free candy and other treats. Although Halloween can be a fun time, the Children's Safety Network

#### Safe Trick-or-Treating

warns that it's also a time when accidents can happen. According to the CSN, the most dangerous day for child pedestrians is Halloween, with two times as many child pedestrians dying on Halloween compared to other days. It is essential to prioritize safety on Halloween, and following

these guidelines can help.


- Make sure costumes are short. Costumes that drag on the floor are tripping hazards, which can lead to injury. Be sure that costumes do not cover the feet or drag on the ground.
- Trick-or-treat in groups. Children are safer in numbers due to the increased visibility of a crowd and because, if something happens, others can call for help. Parents can use their discretion on what age they feel is mature enough to let children go out alone. Until then, children should be accompanied by adults.
- Improve visibility. It's important to be seen while trick-or-treating, and that can be achieved by making sure costumes and trick-or-treat bags feature reflective tape. Trickor-treaters also can carry flashlights or glow sticks to improve visibility, and stick to areas with streetlights if going out after dark.
- Stay on sidewalks. Whenever possible, trick-or-treaters should stick to the sidewalks and avoid walking on the roads. This may not always be possible in neighborhoods without sidewalks, where parents and youngsters must be especially careful.
- Eat before trick-or-treating. A meal or snack before trick-or-treating can reduce the tendency to fill up on candy while out and about. All candy and other treats should be inspected by an adult before it is eaten.
- Keep pets locked away. Animals can become skittish when there are many people loitering outside of homes or ringing doorbells.
- Avoid masks that obstruct vision. It can be hard to see peripherally with a mask on, so avoid costumes with masks that compromise vision.
- Test out makeup beforehand. All makeup used for costumes should be tested for allergic reactions prior to use. Heed the warnings on packaging and avoid putting makeup too close to the eyes or lips.

These are some safety strategies designed to keep Halloween fun and incident-free this year.




